
Kitchen with glass floor, cantilevered over ocean below. The pantry/scullery has phase-shifting glass walls that turn opaque to hide the contents.

Book-matched walnut and Italian laminate make this kitchen both warm and practical. The ell-shaped walnut eating bar is warm to the touch and quieter than stone.



Key to designs like this are deeper counters and other features. With deep counters, RLD can fit a single sink and half a double sink into a 30"-wide cabinet! Extra-long drawer slides enable drawers to store twice as much! A chef's drawer keeps all the chef's favorite accoutrements close at hand.



This glass-box home perched on a ridge needed an expanded kitchen.




Instead of filling in a floor-to-ceiling window, Richard designed an I-beam structure to cantilever the peninsula 4' out in front of the window and 5' into the room. This kitchen was awarded Best Kitchen in the "Art of the Industry" national design contest.





Counters were hand-cast glass over flamed copper and concrete with mother-of-pearl inlays.



Anchor Cove D1 at The Hale Pau Hana, Kihei, Hawaii The island floats on an integrated steel support system. Afromosia transforms the room.





They love having both a prep island and separate cooking island. Counters were Alaskan White granite, orbital-finish stainless steel on the prep island, and walnut.

Grain-matched hickory sets off the 41-1/2"-wide Lacava Aquasei sink.




A solid marble sink and Unique Art Glass counter reside on a floating vanity in the home's powder room.
